

Black History Month: A Year Later – Amanda Gorman

In January 2021, Amanda Gorman read her poem “The Hill We Climb” at the inauguration of President Joe Biden. A year later, she released her poem “New Day’s Lyric” reflecting on the past year and looking forward to the coming year.

Description of the Activity: In this activity, you will be provided with a video of Amanda Gorman speaking “A New Day’s Lyric” along with the written text. You will be asked to respond to three (3) questions about the meaning and significance of the poem. The response to each of the three (3) questions is required to be at least 3-4 sentences in length in order to earn SSL credit.

- 5) Watch Amanda Gorman speak her poem “New Day’s Lyric.” You can also read the poem below. After watching or reading the poem, respond to the three (3) questions below. ****Responses to these questions are required to be at least 3-4 sentences in length in order to earn SSL credit.****
- 6) Question One - In the poem, Amanda Gorman mentions several things in the past which can change in the future (e.g. “battered, we come together”). Quote a line from the poem and provide a real-life example of a problem in the past and how it can change in the future. ****Response is required to be at least 3-4 sentences in length in order to earn SSL credit.****
- 7) Question Two - Describe the feelings the poem evokes from the reader. ****Response is required to be at least 3-4 sentences in length in order to earn SSL credit.****
- 8) Question Three - The poem inspires people to take action, what are you inspired to do after hearing or reading the poem and how will you use this inspiration to motivate others in your community? ****Response is required to be at least 3-4 sentences in length in order to earn SSL credit.****
